The long, wooden-framed dwellings in which family groups of the Iroquois lived were called longhouses.
The Mohawks were an Iroquois tribe allied with the French, but an enemy of the Iroquois League.
The Iroquois League was originally a group of five Iroquois Indian nations (the Seneca, Cayuya, Onondaga, Oneida, and Mohawk tribes) that together formed a government to provide strength, protection, and peaceful relations with one another.
The families of Iroquois who lived together were called clans, and each clan was designated with an animal name such as Bear, Hawk, or Wolf.
The "Three Sisters" are what the Iroquois called the rain, snow, and clouds.
The Iroquois used metal to make canoes, which they used to fish in rivers and lakes.
Sachem is the name of the white and purple beads fashioned into belts that were used for recording such things as agreements and treaties.
Buckskin is tanned deerskin used to make clothing such as blouses, leggings, and moccasins.
The tribal leader of the Iroquois was called a king.
The Iroquois revered the Great Spirit, whom they believed created the world.
